

together as never before. The Ecumenical Thanksgiving Celebration reminds us that we are all Americans."

Co-host Noor Abbady says, "The Ecumenical Thanksgiving Celebration is the epitome of what Atlanta really looks like. Hundreds of people from all backgrounds and faiths, gather to sing, laugh, reflect, and break bread. They gather because of their differences, not in spite of them."

The community is invited to attend this event and join 20 different local churches, temples, mosques, and centers to celebrate different faith traditions with the common goal of working together to improve communities. JUMPING IN HEAD FIRST! HOW BEING THE "NEW KID" CAN BE JUST AS HARD FOR PARENTS

oving to a new town or starting to attend a new school can be hard for kids. We read all the time about ways to help our students make the adjustments easier, or on the flip side, how to help welcome the new kids and help them feel more at home at their new school. That feeling of being new or out of place can be just as hard on parents who are struggling to meet new friends or figure out the in's and out's of a new school, while at the same time trying to ease the transition for our kids. And these feelings are the same, whether we are sending our babies off to kindergarten or to college.

One piece of advice we've all heard is "Get Involved." For students that can mean joining an afterschool club or trying out a sports team. For parents, a great way to get involved is to help out at school. And that is exactly what I decided to do.

For some of you the memory of sending your first child off to kindergarten seems like forever ago. Maybe it is difficult to remember the butterflies that were swimming in your stomach that morning. It wasn't so long ago for me. I remember the anxiety of not knowing if she was going to be afraid when I left, whether she would get lost in the hallway, be able to pull up her own pants in the bathroom. How in the world would she manage the lunch line and the chaotic cafeteria? I remember kindergaten orientation and listening desperately to speakers for information that would prepare us for the milestone. I went to sneak a peek and watched as my child cheerfully met her teacher as I cowered behind her afraid someone would notice that I had no idea what I was doing or how I was going to actually let her go to school the next day. I remember standing in the cafeteria overwhelmed by the clubs and programs and staring at the stage where the PTA was set up-walking up four steps to the stage to ask for information and buy a membership. The memories of my child's first year at school are of me trying to figure out the ropes. What does a copy mom do and is that the same as a room mom? Why can't I send my kid with cookies for snack? Who is teaching my kid popular songs on repeat-like Old Town Road- and what is this band called Kidz Bop Kids? What do you mean I missed the spirit wear deadline?

All of those feelings were overwhelming. Maybe I took a crazy pill, but it motivated me to want to get

more involved. To ease the feelings for the next group of new moms. To create a more welcoming school where parents feel at home and welcome. I don't think it was as much a crazy pill as a desire to invest myself in our community and help shape my kids' school into what I see for the future that pushed me to sign up as President. So now, I am drawing on my experience as a timid, inexperienced new kindergarten mom. I am working with the blank slate that my ignorance of past PTA programs and business has afforded me. I am basically stepping into a room with fresh eyes and a new perspective. Anything goes! Along with some of the most talented and caring volunteers on this planet, we are attempting to build up our PTA with a laser focus on advocating for all children. We are drawing on belief that providing our kids with a learning environment that is collaborative between teachers, administrators, parents and community is a key to their success and our community's enrichment. Our job is to provide the opportunities for parents to be involved, opportunities for businesses to support us, opportunities for teachers to interact with the parents and the children to participate in that. Those are the essential components of a school's success- we must find ways to involve all parents, all families, all teachers, the entire community. We can't force anyone to participate but we can make darn sure they have the chance to.

I am no longer that timid kindergarten mom. I am that PTA volunteer who will introduce myself to the new folks in town before they have a chance to cower in the corner. I will reach out my hand and make it easier for everyone to participate and shape the future of our school's PTA. I will work to empower our community to invest themselves in the success of our kids' school. I'll work to make sure that when someone steps up to lead, they are not seen as "crazy", but rather, persistent, passionate, available and focused on what is best for the kids.

SAME DAY IMPLANT TEETH

Over the past decade there has been a lot of buzz in the media about same day implants and teeth. In some cases, a smile can be restored with a single implant and crown or with multiple implants and a set of teeth in just one day. Dentists must use good judgement when assessing a patient to determine whether same day implant restoration is a good option for that patient. In many cases it is much more difficult to place a single implant and restore it with a crown the same day than it is to place multiple implants and a full set of teeth in one appointment.

Whenever possible, placement of an implant the day a tooth is removed is a dentist's first choice. Same day placement shortens the overall treatment time and allows for only one period of healing. However, much of the time, it is NOT advised to place a tooth on a single implant the same day. Just as concrete needs to set around a pole in order for

the pole to be stable, bone needs to fuse to the implant in order for the implant to take hold. Immediate placement of a tooth requires extreme caution by the patient not to use the tooth for a few months. Many patients and dentists do not want to take the risk of having an implant fail from pressure being placed on the implant too soon during the healing phase. Patients who are concerned about the way their smile looks can have a retainer with a temporary tooth made to replace the missing tooth in the meantime.

If a tooth is to be removed and there is active periodontal disease or an abscess in the area, an immediate implant may not be possible as bone grafting and time for healing may be needed before an implant can be placed. Also, if the gums in the area are thin and in poor condition, an immediate implant may not be possible because grafting of the gum tissue may be

required first. In some cases of implant replacement of an upper back tooth, especially if the tooth has been missing for a period of time, the sinus spaces may have dropped down into that area which means there is little bone above the missing tooth space. In this case, a surgical procedure called a sinus lift may be necessary before an implant can be inserted.

If someone has no teeth or only a few teeth, often there are areas of the arch where there is still sufficient bone so that removal of the remaining teeth does not interfere with placement of 4 to 6 implants at the same appointment. Then a complete set of teeth that have been made in advance can be attached immediately to those implants. However, in some cases the bone is too weak or thin or the gums are too fragile, so bone and/ or gum grafting the area and allowing for healing first is necessary.

Implants are a wonderful way to replace missing teeth. They feel much more like natural teeth than any other prosthesis we have at our disposal in dentistry, and they can last a lifetime, but don't rush them! Allow your dentist and surgeon to devise a treatment plan that will give you the best long-term results so that your new smile functions and looks great for many years to come!

What do I do if my dog or cat bites someone?

You will be required to make a decision about the future of your pet. Confinement is a must under the Cobb County Animal Control Ordinance. This quarantine/confinement is necessary for 10 days. You can choose to quarantine the animal at your vet or the Cobb County Animal Control Shelter. If you do not choose to keep the animal because of the bite, you can request that the animal be put to sleep and tested for rabies. Neither of these options are pleasant, but because of the potential for rabies exposure and/or liability on your part you must make the decision that is best for your situation. Animal Control does not normally adopt out animals that have bitten or scratched, but every situation is considered individually.

Lost & Found Rules & Regulations

- Upon receipt of any domestic animal impounded, wearing a tag, the Cobb County Animal Control Division will make diligent efforts to ascertain the identity of the animal's owner and, if identified, shall, within 24 hours of receipt, contact the owner by telephone. It shall send notice of impoundment to the owner by mail.
- All animals impounded shall be kept at the Animal Control Center for a period of not less than 5 working days unless redeemed within that period.
- Any animal not redeemed shall be considered abandoned to the Animal Control Division, in which all rights of ownership shall vest in the Animal Control Division; and the owner shall have no further claim to such animal.
- The owner must go to the Animal Control Shelter during normal hours to reclaim the pet. You must bring an I.D. (Drivers License or Georgia I.D.) and proof of ownership such as Vet Records. For more info call: 770-499-4136

ORANGE COLLARS SAVE INDOOR CATS

he Nicholsons are your average big family with 5 boys. They are in the car a lot, like most everyone these days, and with several young sets of eyes – they don't miss much happening on the streets in their East Cobb neighborhood.

"Our family has a soft spot for animals. We have stopped many times to load a stray dog into our car, rescue baby squirrels, move turtles to the other side of the road, and even stop traffic to ensure safe duck and geese crossing!" said Megan Nicholson.

One day, one of the boys mentioned that while their family goes to extremes to help some animals – they barely even talk about the cat wandering across someone's lawn or walking down the street. So many people have just grown used to seeing cats outdoors. Several years ago, the Nicholson family lost their cat, Tabby, and they know the pain and anxiety it can cause an owner. They wanted to come up with a way to alert neighbors in the future that a cat is an indoor cat – and needed to be returned home. So, the family created Project Orange Cat. The Nicholson family thought they could help secure the safety and quick return of a cat by putting an orange collar, along with the owner's contact information.

The Nicholson family took on this project to have this one action become a common practice for indoor cat owners

By putting an orange collar on your cat and alerting neighbors that your cat is an indoor cat and needs help if they see it outside. You can purchase an embroidered collar, an orange collar with a tag, or even just buy an orange collar and write your information on it with a Sharpie but, anyway you choose, take this action to keep your cat safe!

"We have all seen a cat wandering in a neighbor's yard or by the local school. Most of the time we just think, "Oh, there's a cute cat!" If you saw a dog wandering around, more than likely you would try to help the dog, hopefully find a tag on its collar, and return



it to its owner. But cat owners just aren't that lucky," Megan said.

Just a few facts:

- Less than 5% of lost cats are returned
- Most roaming cats are never caught or even checked for a micro-chip
- Most cats have never been outside before they got out and are lost
- Cats are not street smart and for the most part have no idea what to do when outside. Most cats have never seen a car, a coyote, a stream or pool. All these scenarios can lead to a very bad ending for your sweet pet.

Alert your neighbors if you have an indoor cat! Educate them on the orange collar and its meaning. Encourage others to alert someone if they see a cat outdoors with an orange collar on!

ON YOUR BARK, GET SET, GO! 5K9 RACE PLANNED FOR 2020

ave the date—June 13, 2020— for the sixth annual 5k9 Race taking place at Piedmont Church in Marietta/East Cobb. Founded by the former president of the Northeast Cobb Business Association (NCBA), Frank Wigington, the 5k9 Race combines staying active, coming together as a community, and spending time with amazing dogs.

The race was founded when the Cobb County Sheriff's Office lost one of its beloved canines. The NCBA wanted to start a fundraiser to aid the purchase of a service dog for the sheriff's office, and the 5k9 Race was born. Since 2014, The 5k9 Race has helped raise money for five service dogs for the Cobb County Sheriff's Office, the Cobb County Police Department, a veteran, a student with autism, and most recently the Cobb County District Attorney's office. The DA's office wanted a dog to help calm witnesses during interviews or testimonies in crimes against children and the elderly. In 2020, SafePath will receive a service dog from the 5k9 Race fundraising. SafePath is a child advocacy center that needs a service dog to assist in the care and comfort of children that come to their center.

One of Wigington's favorite donation stories is that of the student with autism. His mother and father, who work for the county as a special education teacher and a resource officer, respectfully, always wanted a dog for their son with epilepsy and autism, but they were never able to afford one on their own. The service dog they needed cost \$26,000 due to cross-training for both epilepsy and autism. The family had to go through three dogs to find the right match. Their first dog would eat socks! The second dog simply couldn't complete his training, but the third dog was perfect for the family.



With many sponsors from the community, from Commissioner JoAnn Birrell, to the many public safety officials throughout Cobb County, the 5k9 Race is a true community event. Even the county's district attorney's office has its own team known as 'Swift Justice'. With volunteers from Sprayberry and Kell High Schools' football teams and cheerleaders, the 5k9 has become a tradition in East Cobb. "It's a great race for those that love dogs, love their community, and want to make a difference," says Frank Wigington.



WALTON HS OPENS NEW THEATER WITH MATILDA THE MUSICAL



Alton High School's state-of-the-art performing arts center got off to an inspiring start on September 16 when alumni, current students, county school officials and guests enjoyed talent-filled performances at its Grand Opening celebration. More than 200 Walton students in the instrumental, choral and theater arts programs put on a lively show interspersed with brief speeches.





THE GREAT AMERICAN SMOKEOUT: **NOVEMBER 21**

he American Cancer Society marks the Great American Smokeout on the third Thursday of November each year by encouraging smokers to use the date to make a plan to quit, or to plan in advance and quit smoking that day. By quitting — even for one day — smokers will be taking an important step towards a healthier life – one that can lead to reducing cancer risk.

Tobacco use remains the single largest preventable cause of disease and premature death in the United States, yet about 37.8 million Americans–15.5 percent of all Americans–still smoke cigarettes.

Cigarette smoking is the leading cause of cancer death in the United States, accounting for 29% of all cancer deaths. Recognizing the dangers of tobacco use, many Georgians have made the decision to stop using tobacco or tobacco products. Georgia's adult smoking rate dropped to 17.4 percent in 2014 from 18.8 percent in 2013. Even more significant, the smoking rate has dropped to 16.4 percent among young adults ages 18 to 24.

However, more than 50,000 middle and high school students in Georgia say they use e-cigarettes and twice as many say they have tried them.

"Electronic nicotine products go by many names, including "vapes," "vape pens," "e-hookah," "e-cigarettes," and are not safe for youth to use. Teens are trying these products in increasing numbers, despite the fact that they can lead to nicotine addiction, exposure to toxic chemicals, and stroke," said Jean

O'Connor, J.D., Dr.P.H., chronic disease prevention director for the Georgia Department of Public Health.

Emissions from electronic nicotine delivery products may include formaldehyde, propylene glycol, acetaldehyde, acrolein, lead, and tobacco-specific nitrosamines in addition to nicotine.

The Georgia Tobacco Quit Line offers free confidential counseling on how to quit smoking or any nicotine product or delivery system. They provide free counseling, a resource library, support and referral services for tobacco users. It is available for all Georgia residents age 13 or older. The Tobacco Quit Line is funded by the master tobacco settlement through the state's Tobacco Use Prevention Section in partnership with the Georgia Cancer Coalition. It has no commercial bias and no products to promote. As a caller, you will receive free, professional support that's tailored to your needs.

At the Quit Line, a counselor conducts an initial interview with a caller to determine tobacco usage and willingness to quit. An assessment is made based on the caller's needs and multiple options are presented. Callers will receive a customized quit plan, including up to five additional counseling phone calls. Up-to-date information about physician-recommended pharmacological support, such as nicotine gum, nicotine patches, and other items are available. A Tobacco Quit Kit, including materials tailored to the caller's readiness to quit is also available.

So stop smoking and start dialing: call the Tobacco Quit Line at 1-877-270-STOP.



pplications are now being accepted for the 2020 Cobb 101 Citizens Government Academy. The submission deadline is December 2. This 10-week course is designed to provide an in-depth look at the many functions of county government.

With an overprotective mother and barely-

there father, Duke must fight to find his voice, stay in school, and keep his family from falling apart.

"DUKE" has been accepted this past year to 35 film festivals across the United States, the United Kingdom,

Belgium and France, including the American Pavilion Emerging Filmmaker Showcase at the Cannes Film Festival. "DUKE" has won 13 film awards, most recently in the Stage 32 Short Film Contest, which awarded "DUKE" screenings in the Oscar-qualifying 2019 HollyShorts Film Festival and 2019 Raindance Film Festival in the United Kingdom. www.dukeshortfilm. com/the-story.

As a sophomore at Georgia Tech, Robert auditioned for the role in Atlanta and was chosen after sending a persuasive voicemail to the director's personal phone. With permission from his professors to leave school, Robert went to Hollywood in November 2017 for 4 weeks of rehearsals and filming. He prepared for the role by working with a coach alongside the rest of the ensemble, spending time with Duke himself, visiting local schools, gyms, and centers for special-needs children and spending a week in character.

WALTON KIDS CODING FOR

A BRIGHTER FUTURE







alton High School is known for its academic achievements, but one of its best kept secrets is a club called Coding for Community. Two years ago, student Dipen Mehta founded the nonprofit after discovering there were many disadvantaged communities within miles of Walton that may not have access to coding and needed extra help with developing STEM skills. Dipen set out to use his own hobby of coding to enhance the education of children at these schools, elderly homes, and refugee centers that may not have exposure to the same resources and opportunities so that they too can have bright and successful futures.

"Being STEM savvy is very important to be successful in the future," stated Dipen. "STEM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics. STEM is important because it pervades every part of our lives. Science is everywhere in the world around us. Technology is always expanding into every aspect of our lives. Engineering is the basic designs of roads and bridges, but also tackles the challenges of changing global weather and environmentally-friendly changes to our home. Mathematics is in every job, every activity we do in our lives," Dipen explained.

A favorite outreach of the twenty-member high school chapter is going to Powers Ferry Elementary School (a Title I school, where at least 40% come from low-income families) and watching the kids' faces light up with excitement at being able to work with robots and programming through Sphero Robotics, a very user-friendly iPad app that allows young students to explore the basics of coding. The Coding for Community club hopes to expand their outreach to more Title 1 elementary schools in the area, granting students from all backgrounds the opportunity to become proficient in technology.

Outside of the high school chapter, the organization has already achieved many accomplishments within the community and internationally. The group aided the humanitarian crisis involving the Rohingya people of Bangladesh. Coding for Community worked with a nonprofit in Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh to train volunteers in healthcare technology-related protocols and to translate the English materials into the native language of the Rohingya people.

The organization continues to do good in the community. Members visit elderly care facilities where the team helps seniors learn basic computer skills. The club has also created an app called StopFoodWastage, available on iPhone and Android, which connects local restaurants with charities so no food goes to waste and those in need are fed.




